It was an amazing and unforgettable experience to finally visit our own ancestral villages and to meet our relatives over there (even though we couldn't speak Chinese and they couldn't speak any English). This was the thing I most anticipated before the trip! It made it even more special having my brother and sister there too as it was great to share the occasion with them.

We gave our relatives some Macintosh lollies (from New Zealand), recent photos of our relatives in New Zealand, and a cheque from our YaiYai that he sends them each year. I was excited to meet my YaiYai's sister that I had heard about in New Zealand, but unfortunately her sons told us she passed away the month before. They even spoke to my YaiYai for the first time on my cell phone which made the moment very important. I was also surprised to find a photo of myself of when I was younger up on their living room wall – I'm guessing my YaiYai had sent them that photo years ago.

Throughout the rest of the trip we visited various large shopping malls, markets, temples, tea villages, jeans factories, shows, theme parks, and karaoke bars. This trip also finally made me understand what dry-coldness felt like. It was also unbelievable to see frozen rivers and lakes throughout Beijing.

One sight-seeing place that stood out the most for me was trekking along the Great Wall in Beijing. I will always remember trying to fight against the cold blustery wind whilst climbing up and down the craggy and uneven stairs.

Time flew by fast and every time we would realise how many days we had left on the trip, the sadder we felt. However the only thing I was relieved about was that I was lucky enough to make it through the trip without getting sick (Something I think we all tried to avoid!).

This trip has definitely educated and changed my life, where I have gained 27 more close friendships – one of the best things I gained from this trip. It's amazing to get to know other people really well from all different backgrounds and ages within the space of just one month!
